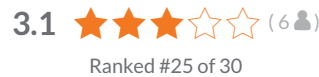
I feel most connected to the 7th ward where I live, but also to the Dewey/Nichols attendance area where my children attended on permissive transfer



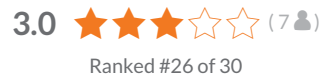

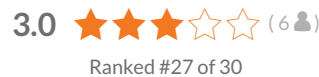

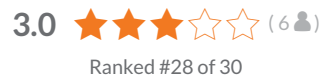
