



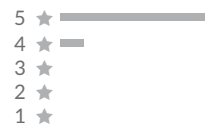

Q1 What is essential for you and your family (walkable? friends from the community? sense of belonging?) and where you are willing to consider trade-offs?

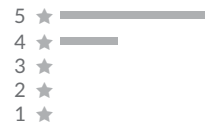
I would like my child to feel valued and see teachers and administrators who look like him even if it meant he had to be bussed.

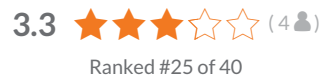
walkable schools in our neighborhood, with our neighbors we had that from Kindergarten on and it contributed mightily to our quality of life



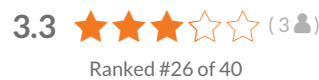
A sense of belonging is most essential. I would (and have) sacrifice neighborhood proximity for a place that offered appropriate services for my child.



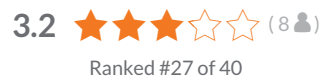

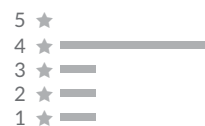
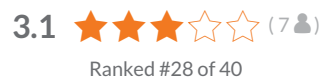
I live in a diverse neighborhood so I don't have to compromise diversity. But I chose that neighborhood for that neighborhood.



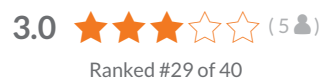
I would be willing for my children to be bused to attend a more diverse school

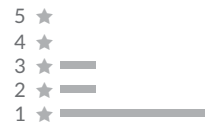
